He then completed a BA (Hons) in Geography and Religious Studies at Canterbury Christ Church University. Following a gap year, Mr Perry completed his QTS through a SCITT course with Bromley Schools Collegiate gaining teaching experience in two Greater London schools.

Mr Perry has worked in 4 schools now gaining experience in teaching many subjects at key stages 3, 4 and 5. He became one of the first Subject Leader appointments at Strood Academy when we opened. Due to the success of the Citizenship department he was appointed to the role of Faculty Leader for Humanities in 2014. Although she initially began her career as a Personal Assistant within a large marketing company her work with a mental health charity for teenagers soon became her drive. After retraining as a Transformational Coach and Safeguarding Officer she secured her first role within education as Head of Year 10 at a local comprehensive based in South East London. Why Choose a Vocational Subject?

BTEC has earned a worldwide reputation as a premier applied learning qualification because it provides learners with a clear route into their career. Today's employers are looking for a confident, work ready employees who have practical knowledge and technical skills that are taught when studying a BTEC.

BTECs are coursework focused which means that, depending on your course; you won't have to do many examinations to get your qualifications. BTECs are good for people who don't like or can't perform well on exams.

BTECs can provide you with real life experience in your industry which is very appealing for potential universities or prospective employers. BTECs can be an excellent way to progress into university and nowadays 95% of universities accept BTECs, including those in the Russell Group (which includes the likes of Oxford University).

In 2015, statistics showed that a quarter of students accepted into higher education held at least one BTEC. The vocational focused BTECs are becoming more popular among students, so it isn't a surprise that universities are adjusting their acceptance requirements and promoting the same respect for BTECs as A-levels receive.

Why do so many students from around the world choose to study A Levels?

1. They are the UK's gold standard for university entry

If it's your ambition to go to university in the UK, then you should consider taking A levels first. Although UK universities do accept other entrance qualifications, the admissions system is geared towards A levels. With A levels you do not have to take foundation courses - you can go straight to your degree.

2. They are the best route into top universities

A levels are the preferred entry qualification for many top universities and the best route for students with an excellent academic record who hope to study at one of the UK's top universities, such as Oxford, Cambridge or other Russell Group institutions. Taking A levels demonstrates your commitment to securing a place at a UK university.

3. They are widely recognised internationally

Because the A level standard is widely recognised by prestigious institutions around the world, not just the UK, it is a great choice if you want to choose from the widest range of options later on. Many other qualifications have to be topped up, but A Levels generally let you skip that stage and smooth the admissions process.

4. They allow you to specialise

While many other university entrance qualifications focus on a broad education, A levels allow you to focus on a few subjects that relate to the course you want to study at university.

5. Employers love A Levels

IB - Careers Programme

What is the IBCP?

The CP is a framework of international education that incorporates the values of the IB into a unique programme addressing the needs of students engaged in career-related education.

The CP Curriculum

CP students undertake a minimum of two IB Diploma Programme (DP) courses. Pupils will also take part in the core which consists of four components that includes approaches to learning, community and service, language development and a reflective project as well as an approved career-related course.

For CP students, DP courses provide the theoretical underpinning and academic rigour of the programme; the career-related study further supports the programme's academic strength and provides practical, real-world approaches to learning; and the CP core helps them to develop skills and competencies required for lifelong learning.

Assessment and Exams

Students take written examinations at the end of their IB Diploma Programme courses which are marked by external IB examiners.

The components of the CP core are assessed by the school.

Who is the CP for?

The CP was specifically developed for students who wish to engage in career-related learning while gaining transferable and lifelong skills in applied knowledge, critical thinking, communication, and cross-cultural engagement.

Pastoral Care

Pastoral care is offered to all our students as soon as they arrive. At Strood Academy we take student wellbeing very seriously and as a result of this we are able to offer an excellent service which allows all of our 6th form students to feel safe, listened to, and valued.

Our Student Wellbeing Manager can offer emotional support and practical tips to those students who may be struggling with the initial transition from Year 11 to Year 12. We are also able to offer a tailored coaching programme to those individuals who aim to explore their beliefs around their academic journey and encourage them to take ownership over some aspects of their learning whilst with the Academy.

Enrichment

As a team we acknowledge that Sixth Form life can be both stressful and demanding. It is important we ensure students maintain a balance between learning and wellbeing. To help with this, we offer our students an enrichment opportunity once a week. Students choose an enrichment option that they must commit to for the entire half term and will get another opportunity to select another option the following half term.

Enrichment options include but are not limited to:

- Mindfulness
- Debate Club
- Exercise and Fitness
- ROAR Female Empowerment Programme
- Coaching Personal Development
- Work Experience

As a team, we encourage students to coordinate events and support them by promoting any initiatives that they may wish to pursue.

Our student wellbeing service offers an open-door policy and students can drop in to speak about any issue that may be of concern to them.



Student Leadership and Student voice

We expect our learners to be active participants in their own right. We have several opportunities for you to voice your opinions and to make a difference. Sixth Form students are encouraged to apply for positions in the Senior Student Leadership Team; roles that involve engagement with students across the academy. Student leadership at Strood Academy is key to enabling young people to realise their potential whilst building on necessary skills, confidence and motivation to allow students to engage directly in the wider improvement of the school. Appointed members are trained in public speaking and leadership skills to ensure they can articulate their point of view with great competency; enabling them to be effective in what they set out to achieve.

Throughout the academic year we encourage Sixth Form students to lead assemblies both in Sixth Form and the Year 7 - 11. Sixth Form students are encouraged to take part in the peer mentoring scheme, 1:1 Maths support for Year 11 students and reading support for Year 7 students. A large number of students act as ambassadors at various public events.

Careers and Work Experience

At Strood Academy we prioritise the future of our young people. Students are supported to make successful transitions when they leave the academy whether into apprenticeships, employment or university. We have a robust Future careers programme that includes trips to UCAS and Apprenticeship fairs, UCAS support from local Universities, CCCU, Greenwich University. Apprenticeship fair, key speaker assemblies, Career fairs and UniFrog support and guidance and much more.

Students complete a work placement to allow them to gain experience of their chosen career to develop key skills allowing them a better understanding of the work placement and the skills required.

16-19 Bursary Fund

The 16 to 19 Bursary Fund provides financial support to help students overcome the specific financial barriers to participation they face so they can remain in education.

There are 2 types of 16 to 19 bursaries:

- bursaries for defined vulnerable groups of up to £1,200 a year
- discretionary bursaries which institutions award using policies they set, in line with these funding rules

Students must meet the age and residency criteria which follow to be eligible for help from the bursary fund.

Age

A student must be aged 16 or over but under 19 at 31 August 2022 to be eligible for help from the bursary fund in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

Institutions should generally only pay bursaries to students aged 16 or over. However, in exceptional circumstances institutions may use their discretion to pay bursaries to younger students, for example, where a student is following an accelerated study programme. Exceptional circumstances do not include students aged 14 to 16 who are attending college as part of their key stage 4 programme.

Students aged under 19 enrolled on higher education qualifications are not eligible for support.

16-19 Vulnerable Student Bursary

A Vulnerable Student Bursary of £1,200 a year is made by the ESFA and paid as 4 payments across the academic year by Strood Academy to students studying within the Sixth Form who apply for the bursary and meet the eligibility criteria set out by the ESFA.

16-19 Discretionary Bursary

A Discretionary Bursary may also be available to young people who do not meet any of the criteria for the above bursaries but are still in need of financial support from any remaining funds. This bursary is available to young people aged 16 to 19 to help with travel to school, equipment, books, essential trips, exam resits or attending HE interviews. The amount is dependent on funding availability and number of applicants.
